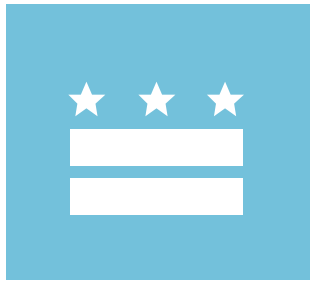

DC Ward Data

The American Community Survey (ACS) 2011-2015 5-year estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau contains information on the characteristics of the population of the District of Columbia's eight wards. This release is based on sample data collected on a monthly basis from January 2011 through December 2015 and covers socio-economic, housing and demographic characteristics of the nation and states, down to the census tract level. The District of Columbia's ward characteristics are included under the State Legislative District (SLD) products. The ACS and other Census Bureau products are collectively important components of the nation's information infrastructure, providing data that are essential to our economy, communities and neighborhoods.

What is the American Community Survey?

The American Community Survey (ACS) is the successor to the former census "long form." The ACS is a nationwide survey that collects and produces information on demographic, social, economic, and housing characteristics about our nation's population every year. This information provides an important tool for communities to use to see how they are changing. When people fill out the ACS form, they are helping to ensure that decisions about the future of their community can be made using the best data available. Decision makers require a clear picture of their population so that scarce resources can be allocated efficiently and effectively. The decennial census program, which includes the ACS and the 2010 Census, serves as the basis for the allocation of more than \$400 billion in federal funds to state, local and tribal governments every year. These vital data also guide planning in the private sector as well as the work done by policymakers at all levels of government and in communities of all sizes. All survey responses are strictly confidential and protected by law. The ACS samples nearly over 3.5 million addresses each year, resulting in nearly 3 million final interviews.

As is the case with all surveys, statistics from sample surveys are subject to sampling and nonsampling errors. All comparisons made in the reports have been tested and found to be statistically significant at the 90 percent confidence level, unless otherwise noted.
