

# O1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



#### **Executive Summary**

The commemorative works location strategy is being developed during a time of considerable interest in memorials across the United States, specifically the subjects that have been commemorated in the past, who decides what is commemorated, and where commemorations are located. As the agency responsible for planning the long-term growth of the District of Columbia and to ensure it reflects our values of an inclusive and vibrant city, the Office of Planning (OP) developed this location strategy to ensure where the commemoration of people, places, and events takes place best reflects the values of the District.

As our nation's capital, Washington, DC has many monuments and memorials dedicated to important people, organizations, and events associated with our nation's history. Existing commemorative works in the District are concentrated around the National Mall, within the boundaries of the historic L'Enfant Plan. and in neighborhoods to the north and west of downtown - there is only one existing memorial in neighborhoods east of the Anacostia River. There are few formal commemorative works dedicated to the people, organizations, and events associated with the local history of the District of Columbia. Commemorating these subjects are important to giving residents and visitors a better understanding of our city and the values of our residents and provide another reason for visitors to venture off the National Mall and explore neighborhoods.



The location of a commemorative work is important to telling the story of its subject and this location strategy is intended to help commemorative work sponsors identify these locations. The people, organizations, and events that are subjects of commemoration are usually tied to a specific place, such as the home or neighborhood of an individual or location of a specific event. It includes a wide range of spaces to accommodate a variety of commemoration types, be it a statue, formal memorial, or smaller elements like a bench or medallion in a sidewalk.

The location strategy provides guidance to sponsors looking for a site, District agencies reviewing proposals, and the Executive Office of the Mayor and District Council during their reviews. It includes three categories of sites based on the level of interest in a subject: DC and the Nation, DC Experience, and DC Faces and Places.

This Strategy helps fulfill the policies identified in the Comprehensive Plan as well as specific recommendations outlined in Mayor Bowser's DC Facilities and Commemorative Expressions (DCFACES) report and the Diverse Washingtonians Commemorative Work Amendment Act.

Any individual or organization that wishes to sponsor a commemorative work in their community should use this location strategy. Applications can be sponsored by a federal or District agency, or an individual, group, or organization described as a 501(c)3 non-profit and authorized by the Mayor and Council to establish a commemorative work on District public space. Sponsors should use this location strategy to identify potential sites that are most appropriate to telling the complete story of a subject.

#### What is a Commemorative Work?

The Commemorative Work Act of 2000 defines a commemorative work as, "any statue, monument, sculpture, streetscape or landscape feature, including a garden or memorial grove, or other structure, which is located in public space and which is located in public space and which is designed to perpetuate in a permanent manner the memory of an individual, group, event, or other significant element of international, national, or local culture or history."

## 02 SITE PROFILES



#### **Site Profiles**

The location strategy organizes sites, defines types of spaces, and identifies specific locations based on feedback from District agencies, the Commemorative Works Committee, National Capital Planning Commission, and District residents. Feedback received during early development of the plan helped define three categories used to organize the sites identified in this document:



#### **DC** and the Nation (Ceremonial Spaces)

These sites are on primary transportation corridors and intended for subjects that are important within a national context, like World War II, 9/11, or the COVID-19 pandemic. Locations are centrally located in each Ward and include high-visibility sites along streets and avenues identified in the Comprehensive Plan as Gateway Corridors, Primary/Secondary Avenues, Primary/Secondary Parkways, and Long-Established Roads. Examples include Connecticut Avenue, 16th Street, or East Capitol Street. The location strategy includes one profile for this type in each Ward.




#### **DC Experience (Shared Spaces)**

These sites are spaces where a broad cross-section of residents come together and intended for subjects with significance to residents in all eight Wards of the District, like sports teams or city-wide political leaders. Locations include spaces centrally located in each Ward and used by a broad cross-section of residents, like plazas at Metro stations, transfer points for bus lines with high ridership, or regional parks. The location strategy includes one detailed profile for this type in each Ward.



#### **DC Faces and Places (Neighborhood Spaces)**

These sites are centers of neighborhood life and intended for subjects with a strong connection to a specific place, like Jewish history in Petworth or Central American culture in Adams Morgan. Locations include spaces evenly distributed throughout each Ward and at the center of neighborhood life, like neighborhood commercial areas, libraries, and recreation centers. The location strategy includes three detailed profiles for this type in each Ward.




# **Identifying the Sites**

Many of the sites identified in this location strategy are located along the gateway corridors, avenues, parkways, and longestablished roads that cross the District of Columbia. The width and orientation of these thoroughfares form wide sidewalks, small triangle parks, and green spaces ideal for commemorative works. Together, thoroughfares and adjacent sites create dramatic points of entry into the District, parklike spaces that define neighborhoods, and connections between large parks and open spaces. Each site has a different character and context that is the result of its location in the District and the type of adjacent thoroughfare.

There are four types of thoroughfares with varying origins and purpose, each creating distinct places and experiences:

#### **Gateway Corridors**




Gateway corridors are green and landscaped entryways that begin at the District line, continue into the center of the District, and have a continuous landscaped median. All have a wide right-of-way, and several are embellished with parks, frame prominent views to the capitol dome and White House or are part of the District's identity as the nation's capital.

Avenues are formal streets with wide rightsof-way lined with generous sidewalks or landscaped areas. The role they play in the District varies. Some have dramatic views to the capitol dome or serve as entrances to the District. All are embellished with open spaces like circles, squares, and triangle parks.

#### **Long-Established Roads**



Parkways are streets with formal and natural characteristics, meander through and around the District, and are lined with generous green space. Primary parkways can be embellished with formal circles, triangles, and medians and form a network connecting large parks and open spaces; secondary parkways wind through neighborhoods, are embellished with triangle parks and medians, and lead into large parks.

Long-established roads have irregular alignments that follow topography and predate or were created very early in the District's history to connect communities outside of the L'Enfant City. Their rights-of-way have variable widths, some extend from the District line to downtown, and others are only short segments. All of them create triangle parks where their irregular alignments intersect with neighborhood streets.

# **Types of Sites**

This location strategy includes a wide variety of sites controlled by different District agencies and of different sizes, contexts, and other site characteristics. Most sites identified in the location strategy are managed by the DC Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) and the DC Department of Transportation (DDOT). Some sites are on the grounds of public buildings or open spaces controlled by DC Public Schools (DCPS), DC Public Library (DCPL), or DC Department of General Services (DGS). A commemorative work sponsor must obtain the support of the District agency responsible for managing a site, meet the requirements of that agency, and complete additional reviews required by that agency. Some of the sites identified in the strategy are managed by a District agency but the underlying ownership is federal. In those cases, commemorative works proposed for those sites need to be reviewed by the National Capital Planning Commission and Commission of Fine Arts. If a site is in public space immediately adjacent to private property – including the Washington Area Metro Transit Authority - the property owner also needs to support the proposal.

Forty sites – five in each Ward – have been identified as preferred locations and have detailed information in an individual profile. Detailed profiles on additional sites will be added over time. This inventory includes many sites, but sites not identified in this location strategy can also be considered for potential commemorative works.

The commemorative works location strategy lists potential sites by category and Ward, based on 2022 Ward boundaries. All potential locations are under the control of a District agency.

There are seven types of sites identified in this location strategy:

- Triangle Parks and Open Spaces
- Medians
- · Wide Sidewalks
- · Civic Buildings and Spaces
- Large Parks
- Waterfronts
- Plazas

#### **Triangle Parks and Open Spaces**

Located at the intersection of thoroughfares and the District's traditional grid of streets, these spaces are typically along heavily travelled roadways and highly visible. These small sites can include memorials that are part of small neighborhood parks with seating, public art, and space for gatherings and passive recreation. These sites are typically managed by DPR or DDOT.

#### **Medians**

These landscaped spaces are in the center of avenues and parkways that are gateway corridors into the District, wide avenues of the L'Enfant Plan, or lead to large parks and open space. They are good for small to medium size sculptures intended to be viewed by pedestrians or by passengers in a passing vehicle. These sites are managed by DDOT.

#### Wide Sidewalks

These areas of the public right-of-way between the curb and property line are more than 20' wide and include paved walkways and/ or landscaped areas. They are ideal for incorporating memorials into a streetscape. like medallions in aww sidewalk or sculptural figures in landscaped areas. Wide sidewalks are usually found in neighborhood commercial districts, can include landscaped areas, and are managed by DDOT. Commemorative works in these locations need the support of the adjacent property owner as well as DDOT.

#### **Civic Buildings and Spaces**

These sites include green spaces or highly visible areas at public buildings like entrances to schools, fire stations, police departments, recreation centers, and libraries. They vary greatly in size and scale, and examples of memorials appropriate for these spaces range from traditional statues surrounded by landscaping to sculptural elements incorporated into monumental stairs. These sites are managed by the District agency responsible for the adjacent building.

#### **Large Parks**

Large multi-use parks that draw residents from across the District have multiple sites appropriate for commemorative works. They can be incorporated into recreational activities and areas of open space, recreation centers, athletic fields, group picnic areas, hiking trails, and other activity areas. Large parks are managed by DPR.

#### **Plazas**

These sites are large and small paved areas active with pedestrians in a commercial area or going to and from entrances to metro stations. Many plazas are controlled by the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority or the private sector, but there is typically paved or landscaped areas adjacent to these plazas managed by DDOT.

#### **Commemorative Works Review Process**



The sponsor of a commemorative work is responsible Start for all necessary reviews & approvals. Office of Planning staff can advise sponsors during the review process.

#### **Pre-Application Coordination**



Meet with the Office of Planning (OP), the agency designated to process and review commemorative works applications, to discuss the review process before completing a commemorative works application (posted on OP's website). 4 to 6 weeks



#### Submit Application and Complete Initial Concept Review

Submit application to Commemorative Works Committee (CWC) for Concept Review. 4 weeks



#### Complete Required Reviews

May include impacted District agencies, utility companies, Advisory Neighborhood Commissions, and other District and Federal review bodies. 4 to 8 weeks



#### Commemorative Works Committee **Final Review**

Meet with the CWC for a final review of the application before it makes a recommendation to the Mayor and District Council.

4 to 8 weeks

Estimated Time for Completing Review: 4-7 Months

Next Steps for Final Approval and Permitting



Seek Mayor and Council Approval of a Resolution or Bill Authorizing the Commemorative Work

Work with the Mayor or District Council member to submit legislation for consideration and final action.

# **Location Strategy Public Engagement**

The Office of Planning held a virtual public meeting in February 2021 to discuss the location strategy, themes for organizing sites, and specific sites to be profiled. During the meeting District residents participated in a public survey where they identified commemorative works as something that can create a sense of pride and community, as well as opportunities to educate new residents or children growing up in their neighborhood.


