
Women's History Month: March 2017



The Roots of National Women's History Month

The roots of National Women's History Month go back to March 8, 1857, when women from New York City factories staged a protest over working conditions. International Women's Day was first observed in 1909, but it was not until 1981 that Congress established National Women's History Week to be commemorated the second week of March. In 1987, Congress expanded the week to a month. Every year since, Congress has passed a resolution for Women's History Month, and the President has issued a proclamation.

There were 352,523 women in the District of Columbia in 2015. Women made up 52.4 percent of the District's total population for 2015.
