District of Columbia Business Ownership: 2007 Economic Census

The U.S. Census Bureau recently released preliminary estimates of business ownership data for 2007 shows the number of minorityowned businesses increased by 45.6 percent to 5.8 million between 2002 and 2007, more than twice the national rate of all U.S. businesses. In addition, the number of women-owned businesses increased 20.1 percent during the same period. The total number of U.S. businesses increased between 2002 and 2007 by 18.0 percent to 27.1 million. For the District of Columbia, black-owned and women-owned businesses have shown significant increases from 2002 to 2007, both by number of establishments and revenues from sales and receipts.

according to new tabulations released by U.S. Census Bureau's 2007 Survey of Business Owners (SBO).

- While the number of U.S. businesses increased by 18 percent between 2002 and 2007, the number of minority-owned businesses increased 45.6 percent for the same period.
- In the District of Columbia, black-owned, and women-owned businesses have shown significant increases from 2002 to 2007. Black-owned businesses increased their numbers by 29.3 percent, while women-owned businesses were up by 23 percent.
- Sales and receipts from all firms in the District increased by 14.4 percent from 2002 to 2007.
- Professional, scientific, and technical services industry accounted for the largest number of establishments and made the highest in sales and receipts among all District establishments in 2007.

Highlights

DC Black-Owned Businesses

- There were 15,772 black-owned businesses in 2007, up 29.3% from 2002.
- 28% of all businesses in DC were black-owned.
- Receipts of black-owned businesses were \$2.4 billion in 2007, up 51.7% from 2002.

DC White-Owned Businesses

- There were 32,421 white-owned businesses in 2007, up 15.3% from 2002.
- 58% of all businesses in DC were owned by whites.
- Receipts of white-owned businesses were \$18.2 billion in 2007, up 21.9% from 2002.

DC Asian-Owned Businesses

- There were 3,288 Asian-owned businesses in 2007, up 36.4% from 2002.
- 5.9% of all businesses in DC were owned by Asians.
- Receipts of Asian-owned businesses were \$1.9 billion in 2007, up 85.9% from 2002.

DC American Indian Businesses

- There were 507 American Indian-owned businesses in 2007, up 130.5% from 2002.
- 0.9% of all businesses in DC were owned by American Indian.

• Receipts of American-owned businesses were \$58 million in 2007, up 11.9% from 2002.

DC Hispanic-Owned Businesses

- There were 3,424 Hispanic owned businesses in 2007, up by 57.9% from 2002.
- 6.1% of all businesses in DC were owned by Hispanics.
- Receipts of Hispanic-owned businesses were \$953 million, up 73.9% from 2002.

DC Women-Owned Businesses

- There were 19,283 women-owned businesses in 2007, up 23% from 2002.
- 34% of all firms in DC were women-owned in 2007.
- Receipts totaled \$3.8 billion, up 59% from 2002.

DC Minority-Owned Businesses

- There were 22,523 minority-owned businesses in 2007, up 33.9% from 2002.
- 40% of all firms in DC were owned by minorities in 2007.
- Receipts totaled \$5.2 billion in 2007.

Some Business Resources

- The **Department of Small and Local Business Development** (DSLBD) works with the Office of Contracting and Procurement (OCP) to match small, disadvantaged businesses with contracting opportunities with the DC government and elsewhere. DSLBD also fosters economic development of DC's small business community through technical assistance, business seminars, conferences, exhibits, and outreach forums, among other programs.
- Businesses that seek technical assistance related to doing business in the District may contact the Georgia Avenue Business Resource Center (GABRC). GABRC, an initiative of the DC Chamber of Commerce, supports businesses with counseling, mentoring,

training, access to capital, and a computer lab. GABRC operates a **US Small Business Administration (SBA)** Sub-Center to provide access to SBA programs for local businesses.

- The Enhanced Business Information Center (e-BIC), an initiative of the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development, the DC Public Library, and the SBA, is located in the heart of downtown DC at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Library. The e-BIC offers training, counseling, and access to computers and business software and office space for businessclient meetings.
- The **Certified Capital Company Program** was enacted by DC Council to provide \$50 million in long-term equity (and debt) for new or expanding small businesses based in DC.
- DC Chamber of Commerce Business Resource Center: Businesses that seek technical assistance related to doing business in the District may contact the DC Chamber of Commerce Business Resource Center (DCCCBRC). DCCCBRC, an initiative of the DC Chamber of Commerce, supports businesses with counseling, mentoring, training, access to capital, and a computer lab. DCCCBRC operates a US Small Business Administration (SBA) Sub-Center to provide access to SBA programs for local businesses.
- The **Washington, DC Economic Partnership:** The center actively promotes and markets the District of Columbia as the premier city in the region and nation. Through marketing outreach efforts, such as **BusinessPremier**, the center will enhance the economic development of the District through business retention and recruitment programs, retail retention and recruitment efforts, the creation of public/private partnerships, and the provision of information related to the District's economic development.
- **Certified Business Enterprises (CBEs) Business Center:** Companies that wish to do business with the District government or with other CBEs can gain quick access to several features, including searching for CBE opportunities, checking business enterprise zones, and certifying businesses as CBEs.
- **SCORE**: SCORE, "Counselors to America's Small Business," is a nonprofit association dedicated to providing entrepreneurs with free, confidential face-to-face and email business counseling. SCORE offers seminars that are posted on the SBA **training calendar** and online training through the SCORE Business **Toolbox** and **Learning Center**.
- **USSmall Business Administration**: The Washington Metropolitan Area District Office of the US Small Business Administration (SBA) offers workshops, seminars, and courses. Many of these

The SBA also offers online training at the **E-Business Institute**, a virtual campus that hosts free training courses, workshops, and resources designed to assist entrepreneurs.

• The Washington Area Community Investment Fund, Inc.: The Washington Area Community Investment Fund, Inc. (WACIF) provides technical assistance and access to capital in order to strengthen small businesses and build other assets in the community, such as housing, community-based facilities, and child care facilities.
