Older Americans Month: May 2014 Facts on District Residents 65 Years and Older

A meeting with the National Council of Senior Citizens resulted in President John F. Kennedy designating May 1963 as Senior Citizens Month, encouraging the nation to pay tribute to older people across the country. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter's proclamation changed the name to Older Americans Month, a time to celebrate those 65 and older through ceremonies, events and public recognition. The below facts on older Americans in the District of Columbia were obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey (ACS) 2012 1-Year data.

71,900

The number of people who were 65 and older in the District of Columbia on July 1, 2012. This group accounted for 11.4 percent of the total population.

11.9%

The percent of people 65 and older (8,307) who were in poverty in 2012.

53.7%

The percent of householders 65 and older living alone.

12,223

Estimated number of people 65 and older who were veterans of the armed forces in 2012.

23.5%

Labor force participation rate for the 65 and older in 2012, up from 21.6 percent in 2008. Further age group analyses for the 30 plus years since 1990, show the labor force for both the 65-69 years and the 70 and over decreased slightly in 2000 but increase significantly by 2012 (Figure 1).

81.3%

Proportion of people 65 and older in 2012 who had completed high school or higher education.

37.8%

Percentage of the population 65 and older in 2013 who had earned a bachelor's degree or higher.

15.2%

Percentage of people 65 and older who were never married in 2012.

26.2%

Percentage of people 65 and older in 2012 who were widowed.

62.7%

Percentage of householders 65 and older who owned their homes in 2012.

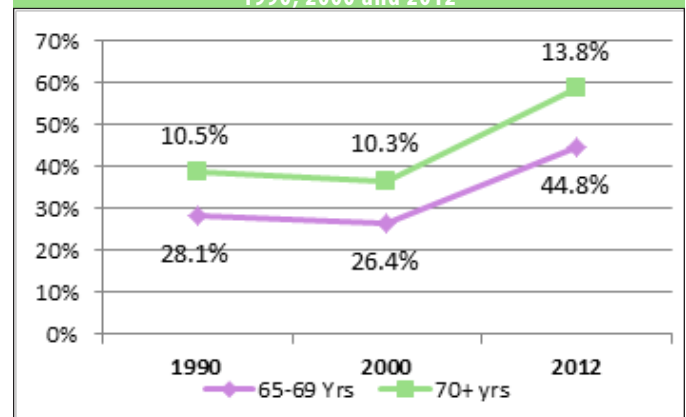
